91. 1-25-2
A foul tip is a batted ball that goes sharply and directly from the bat to the catcher's glove or hand and is legally caught by the catcher. That means that a batted ball with a perceptible arc that goes back toward the catcher and is held is caught foul ball and a put out
92. 2-56-3
It is a strike when any part of the ball on a legal pitch enters the strike zone in flight.

93. 3-3-9
Because F8 has been rendered apparently unconscious, she will not be permitted to play again that day without written authorization from a physician (M.D/D.O.)
94. 3-3-5
Any starting player may re-enter the game.
All substitutes may re-enter the game.
A player who violates the re-entry rule is considered an illegal substitute.
95. 3-6-2
The umpire will warn the coach of the team at bat for a carelessly thrown bat. For a second offense, the offender will be restricted to the dugout for the rest of the game
96. 6-2-3 penalty and exception
The ball was delayed dead ball on the illegal pitch but became immediately dead when B3 stepped on the plate and hit a foul ball. The illegal pitch takes precedence over the illegally batted ball. Though the situation technically presents an option for the offensive team to take the result of the play, the team at bat will certainly want to have the illegal pitch penalty enforced.
R2 is awarded 3rd base and ball is added to B3 for a count of 2-1
97. 7-2-1d; 2-25-2
Foul ball. B2 continues to bat with a 1-2 count
98. 8-6-2
R1 is out. A fielder cannot push a runner off a base, but the runner must have control of her body while on the base. If R1 is tagged, but not pushed off the base, the runner is out if she loses contact with the base while the fielder holds the ball on her person.
99. 8-6-10a
Running in front of a fielder and/or jumping over a batted ball is not in itself to be construed as interference even if the action complicates the play for the fielder. If the runner is running normally and does nothing to intentionally hinder the fielder, interference should not be called.
100. 8-6-1
R2 is NOT out because R2 did not run more than three feet out of her established base path to avoid a tag by a fielder.
